Executive Summary:

Prof. Vaucher Yvonne's visit to the West Nile region from March 25th to 29th, 2024, was dedicated to enhancing the knowledge and skills of healthcare workers regarding follow-up clinic procedures and the neural development of neonates. Throughout her fieldwork, she visited a total of 6 hospitals, with 7 hospitals participating in her lectures.

Starting on Monday, March 25th, Prof. Yvonne conducted lectures at Nebbi General Hospital, with attendees from Nebbi GH and St. Luke Angal Hospital. Subsequent lectures were held on Tuesday at Arua Regional Referral Hospital and Koboko Hospital, followed by Yumbe RRH on Wednesday, Moyo General Hospital on Thursday, and Adjumani General Hospital on Friday.

During her visit, She meticulously inspected NICU units and KMC rooms in each hospital, ensuring a comprehensive understanding of the facilities' capabilities and challenges. A total of 100 healthcare providers were trained during the sessions, consisting of 83 females and 17 males.

The training sessions were met with enthusiasm and positive feedback from the participants, indicating a significant impact on their skills and knowledge in neonatal care.

Furthermore, it is worth noting that the West Nile region in Uganda had been experiencing a prolonged dry spell, with little to no rainfall for several months. However, coinciding with Dr. Yvonne's visit, each district she visited experienced unexpected rainfall. Some participants even humorously remarked, "Wow, Professor Yvonne has brought us rain."

Overall, Prof. Yvonne's visit to the West Nile region proved to be a transformative experience, empowering healthcare workers and fostering improvements in neonatal care services throughout the region.

Background

In Uganda, the issue of inadequate follow-up care for newborns post-hospital discharge is a significant concern. Many infants are discharged from healthcare facilities without adequate monitoring and support, leaving them vulnerable to undetected health complications.

Early follow-up after discharge is crucial, particularly for high-risk infants, as it allows for the timely identification of potential congenital malformations or signs of illness that may not be apparent during the immediate newborn period. This early intervention can significantly improve outcomes and reduce the risk of

Recognizing the critical need to address these gaps in newborn care, Dr. Margaret
Nakakeeto through her foundation
"Nakakeeto Foundation", in collaboration with the Newborn Steering Committee-Ministry of Health, took proactive steps to enhance follow-up practices. This initiative included inviting Prof. Vaucher Yvonne, a distinguished expert in the High-Risk Infant
Neurodevelopment Follow-Up program, to visit healthcare facilities in the West Nile region.



ABOUT WEST NILE



The West Nile sub-region is an area in the northwestern part of Uganda, named after its location on the western side of the Albert Nile. It shares borders with the Democratic Republic of the Congo to the south and west, South Sudan to the north, and the Albert Nile to the east. The largest town in the sub-region is Arua, which recently became a city. Arua is about 420 kilometers (260 miles) northwest of Kampala, the capital of Uganda. West Nile is becoming a rapidly growing economic center in Uganda, with 11 districts, including Adjumani, Arua, Koboko, Maracha, Moyo, Nebbi, Yumbe, Zombo, Obongi, Madi Okollo, and Pakwach.

The population of West Nile is around 2,988,300 people, living in approximately 500,000 households as estimated in 2018. The region's social life revolves around households, and local governance is centered in villages. The ethnic composition includes Sudanic groups like Lugbara, Kakwa, Madi, and Nilotic Alur. Other ethnicities present are Ukebu, Kuku, Nubians, along with various Ugandan tribes, Indians, other Asians, Congolese, and South Sudanese. The region has 10 hospitals, 10 HC IVs, 18 HC IIIs and 12 HC IIs. West Nile hosts the largest refugee settlement in Africa, including the second-largest in the world, the Bidi bidi settlement. The refugee health system operates separately from the host system.

Improve the efficiency and effectiveness of follow-up clinic procedures, including standardized assessment protocols, documentation practices, and communication strategies, to optimize the delivery of care to highrisk infants and their families.

02 Implement Best Practices:

Equip healthcare providers with evidencebased strategies and tools for assessing and monitoring the neurodevelopmental progress of high-risk infants, enabling early intervention and personalized care plans.

04 Foster Collaboration:

Foster collaboration and knowledgesharing among healthcare providers, multidisciplinary teams, and community stakeholders involved in the care of high-risk infants, promoting a holistic and integrated approach to neurodevelopmental follow-up.

NEBBI GH AND ST. LUKE ANGAL HOSPITAL

Nebbi General Hospital:

Established in 1969 during the first government of Prime Minister Milton Obote, Nebbi General Hospital has been a cornerstone of healthcare in Nebbi District. Initially, the hospital faced infrastructure challenges common to many government healthcare facilities of its era, including outdated equipment and dilapidated infrastructure. However, despite these obstacles, Nebbi GH has persisted in providing essential healthcare services to the community.

Located in the heart of Nebbi town's central business district, the hospital serves as the district's primary healthcare facility, catering to the medical needs of residents in Nebbi and surrounding areas. It boasts a bed capacity of 108, ensuring that patients receive adequate care and attention during their stay. Nebbi General Hospital is situated approximately 78 kilometers southeast of Arua Regional Referral Hospital, positioning it strategically within the West Nile sub-region of Northern Uganda.

St. Luke Angal Hospital:

St. Luke Angal Hospital is a privately-owned, non-profit community hospital under the auspices of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Nebbi. Accredited to the Uganda Catholic Medical Bureau and administered by the Comboni Missionaries, St. Luke Angal Hospital plays a vital role in providing healthcare services to the community. Its affiliation with religious institutions underscores its commitment to delivering holistic care that addresses both the physical and spiritual needs of patients.

The hospital serves a diverse patient population, drawing individuals not only from Nebbi District but also from neighboring districts such as Arua and Zombo. Additionally, patients from neighboring countries, including South Sudan and the Democratic Republic of the Congo, seek medical attention at St. Luke Angal Hospital, highlighting its regional significance. With a robust infrastructure and a bed capacity of 260, the hospital employs 153 full-time medical and support staff, ensuring the delivery of quality healthcare services.



Training Session at Nebbi GH and St. Luke Angal Hospital:

During the training session at Nebbi General Hospital and St. Luke Angal Hospital, healthcare providers from both institutions actively participated in knowledge exchange and skill-building activities. 






Figure 1. Showing distribution of participants by CADRE.

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Figure 1. Showing distribution of participants by Gender.









Figure 2. Showing distribution of participants by Gender.


















Figure 2. Showing distribution of participants by Gender.

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ADJUMANI GENERAL HOSPITAL

Adjumani General Hospital, located in Adjumani Town, Uganda, serves as a critical healthcare facility in the Northern Region, addressing various medical needs, including malaria and respiratory infections. With a bed capacity of 100 and an average of 200 outpatient visits daily, the hospital is a lifeline for the community, handling approximately 10 deliveries each day.

Adjumani GH, a public hospital owned by the Ugandan Government and administered by the Ministry of Health, caters to patients not only from Adjumani District but also from neighboring districts such as Amuru and Moyo, and even from South Sudan. Despite resource constraints, the hospital staff demonstrates dedication and resilience in providing essential healthcare services to the community.

The visit to Adjumani GH coincided with Good Friday, a public holiday, yet the commitment of participants ensured the success of our training session. The visit commenced with an inspection of the hospital's Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) and Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC) room, where Prof. Yvonne expressed satisfaction with the quality of care provided. Despite the holiday closure of hospital offices, participants ensured the availability of the boardroom for our training session. Although lacking visual aids, the participants provided valuable insights into their follow-up practices during the session.






Conclusion:



PROF. YVONNE'S EXPERTISE: EMPOWERING NEONATAL HEALTHCARE ACROSS WEST NILE

Prof. Yvonne E. Vaucher, MD, MPH from the University of California, San Diego, Division of Neonatology, conducted a comprehensive series of lectures across several hospitals in the West Nile region of Uganda from March 25th to 29th, 2024. Her presentations focused on "Improving Newborn Outcomes in Uganda" and covered a wide range of topics aimed at enhancing neonatal care practices and neurodevelopmental follow-up procedures.

The lectures began with an overview of the evolution of neonatal care practices, highlighting advancements in respiratory support, drug treatments, and nutrition, which have significantly improved outcomes for high-risk infants. Prof. Yvonne emphasized the importance of addressing long-term neurodevelopmental risks, such as cerebral palsy, cognitive impairment, and sensory impairments, which are prevalent among very low birth weight infants.

She underscored the critical interventions needed before and after birth to reduce the risk of poor neurodevelopmental outcomes, including antenatal care, skilled birth attendance, immediate breastfeeding initiation, and postnatal monitoring for complications. Additionally, she outlined the essential components of neurodevelopmental follow-up programs, emphasizing the importance of early assessment, standardized screening exams, and adjusted age considerations for preterm infants.

Throughout her visit, Prof. Yvonne interacted with healthcare providers, sharing valuable insights and practical strategies for improving neonatal care practices and promoting optimal neurodevelopmental outcomes. Her lectures were well-received by participants, who appreciated the opportunity to enhance their skills and knowledge in this critical area of healthcare.

Furthermore, Her visit provided a platform for collaborative learning and knowledge exchange among healthcare professionals in the West Nile region. Attendees benefited from engaging discussions, hands-on demonstrations, and access to cutting-edge research and best practices in neonatal care.



Recommendations

Additionally, deploying fellows to facilitate training sessions can enhance capacity-building efforts and sustain knowledge transfer at regional levels.

2

Provide continued support for follow-up programs to ensure the effective implementation and sustainability of high-risk infant neurodevelopmental follow-up initiatives. This support can include resource allocation, technical assistance, and monitoring and evaluation frameworks to assess program effectiveness and address any emerging challenges.




